MAYOR'S COMMENTS

On May 16th at 6:30 p.m. the Planning Commission will kick off a land use planning process for South Willard. Due to increasing requests for Willard municipal services and changes in state and county ordinances, we are processing an increased number of annexation applications. Two areas have been annexed in the last few years. The current county land use plan for South Willard is a rough scale and does not consider infrastructure such as roads, trails and parks. As city leaders we feel it is important that annexation applications are processed orderly, and that citizens of South Willard and Willard have input in how the community develops. Please plan to attend the meeting at City Hall. Help us spread the word to our friends in South Willard. County and city officials will be in attendance to take comments and answer questions.

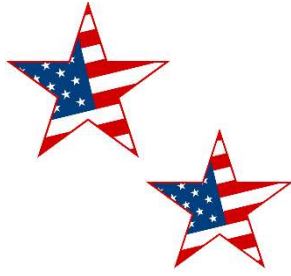

Year-round assistance is available for eligible applicants in Cache, Box Elder, and Rich counties.

With federal and utility funding BRAG provides a range of services, such as attic insulation, wall insulation, air sealing, repair or replace damaged heating systems, evaluate to replace windows, and installing ventilation fans to meet ASHRAE standard, to improve your home's energy efficiency at NO COST to the applicant.

DEPARTMENTS

ADMIN – We would like to welcome Nick Rasmussen back to our Public Works team!

POLICE – Chief Fielding is asking drivers to be alert. There has been an increase in pedestrian traffic crossing Highway 89 to support the new Fizz business. School will soon be out, which means more children will be walking around the community.

The Police Department is still following up on unlicensed dogs.

Willard City requires all door-to-door salespeople to be licensed. If they are licensed, they should be wearing a city-issued ID. If a door-to-door salesperson does not have a city-issued ID, please close the door and call dispatch at 435-734-3800 Option 0.

FIRE - Open burning will continue through May 30th. Apply for burn permits at www.boxeldercounty.org or by calling 435-734-3300. Burn permits can ONLY BE ISSUED IF THE [Clearing Index](#) is above 500 for Airshed 4. State requirements limit burning to natural vegetation only, i.e.: tree trimmings, leaves, etc. That means no construction debris, household garbage, tires, etc. cannot be burned. Other methods of disposal will need to be used for these items. Burn Permits for Saturday will be issued on Friday, but you will have to check the Clearing Index before you start burning on Saturday. There is no burning on Sunday.

PUBLIC WORKS – Public Works will be changing more water meters this month. Please make sure that nothing is covering your meter boxes.

Please help to protect our water system. Don't leave a hose in a pool. It can contaminate our drinking water. If you plan to put in a sprinkling system, you can find information about backflow prevention and avoiding cross connections at www.utah.gov/drinking-water/cross-connection-control-backflow-prevention. 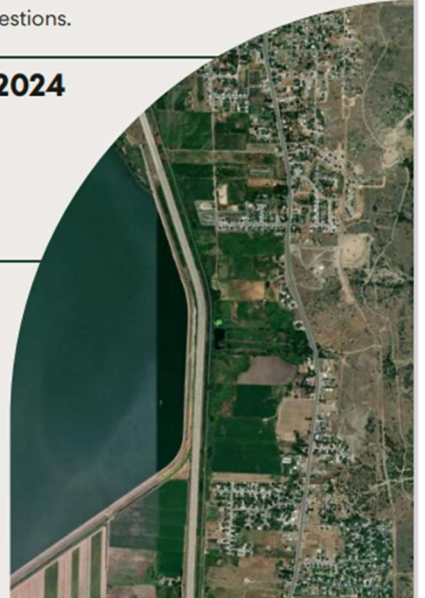

Preparing Starts with the Fundamentals

Realizing you are on your own when it comes to major disasters can feel overwhelming.

You may start thinking about building a bunker. But building a survival bunker takes a lot of time and money. Do not start there. Instead, start preparing by focusing on the fundamentals.

You need to cover the basics of survival first:

- **Finances** – Pay down debt and start saving. **Keep cash on hand** for when ATMs and credit card machines stop working. Have gold and silver in your preparedness stash.
- **Buy and store** items you can **barter** in an emergency.
- **Food** – **Stockpile enough food for your family.** Start with a three-day supply and steadily build it until you have enough food to survive a grid failure confidently.
- **Water** – Invest in **water filtration tools** so you can rest assured your family can have safe drinking water, even when water systems are contaminated.
- **Power** – Have backup power sources ready, and at the top of your list should be a **solar generator.**
- **Health** – If you have required prescription medications, make sure you have enough for a month. **Refill regularly** and ask your doctor for **an extra dose** in case of emergencies.

Start with the basics and grow from there.
