

CONSTRUCTION NOTICE

Willard city would like you to be aware of the following announcement:

On Wednesday, May 29th, Staker Parson will begin chip seal operations on various city streets. They anticipate construction will be complete by Wednesday, June 5th.

Construction consists of preparing roadway surface for chip seal, spreading chips, and applying a surface oil treatment. This is a three-step process and is expected to take several days.

Residents may experience travel delays and temporary access restrictions until chip seal operations are complete.

Please consider parking vehicles off city streets. Remove any debris in roadways and minimize sprinkler use in park strip areas between the daytime hours of 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Vehicles that remain on the street during construction operations are subject to being towed at the owner's expense.

If assistance is needed at any time, please safely approach a Staker Parson employee.
